


# Material #1: Fruit-by-the-Foot






# Reflection


# Material #2: Hubba-Bubba Gum



## Reflection





# Analysis



#### Names:

Clothespins, wooden clips, clips, fasteners, clippys.

#### **Uses:**

Clothespins are traditionally used to pin clothes on a line so that they wont fall off in the when drying. However clothespins nowadays are used for holding chips bags together and for other thing in that manner to "close" or "pin" something together.



#### Features

<u>Color</u>: Natural light raw wood, but can come in colored plastic. <u>Weight:</u> Extremely lightweight <u>Texture:</u> Smooth, wood like (or plastic) <u>Smell:</u> They smell like wood (or plastic) <u>Taste:</u> They is generally no taste, expect for maybe a wood-like/earthy scent. <u>Size:</u> The clothespins I purchased are about 2 inches long and about a 1.5 centimeters wide. About the size of a normal index finger.

#### **Inherent Properties:**

The clothespins could be described as small, useful, simple, helpful, binding.

# Words that are associated with clothespins:

clip, dryer, clothes, pinching, clipping, snapping, wooden, clean, washing, drying

#### **Raw Materials / Processes:**

Clothespins are made and cut typically from wood by a machine, but they can also be modeled from plastic. The spring is made from metal and stretched between the two wooden sides to create a tension in order for the clip to hold things together.

#### **Parts:**

The clothespins have 3 simple parts to them: two wooden sides and a metal spring in the middle. They can be easily disassembled if you twist and then pull them apart. You might need to use a tool to break the wooden sides in half because they are fairly small and strong. You also may need to use pliers to bend the metal spring a certain way. I think no matter how you disassemble the clothespin it will always be recognizable because the grooves in the wood sides are suggestive of the object because there haven't been a lot of modifications of the tradition clothespin design.









# Concept

The title of my type face is "Hung Up" because it refers to the nature of which the item is typically used for. It is playful because it also refers to a feeling or saying about someone who is stuck or specifically focused on an idea, object, task, or other person. In a sense I was "hung up" on what material to decide on proceeding with, resulting in clothespins.





# Set Up:

After photographing the concept photos, I knew I wanted to incorporate the true nature of my object. Thus, I challenged myself to set up a clothesline outside to clip the clothespins on the line in order to spell "Hung Up." Creating the setup for this photo was more difficult than I thought, due to the wind blowing the clothesline and trying to find an open area with trees that did not block the sky. After setting up the clothesline an issue arose that limited my perspective was not being able to shoot at a higher angle to eliminate the ground's horizon. I ended up deciding my final image to be more like a silhouette taking the focus off of the colored striped socks and more so on the letter forms standing out from the sky.
